

The 28th Nagasaki International Festival - Guidelines for how to participate

■ Items and materials for the exhibitions

- ① Display of the information about activities, international cooperation/exchange organizations
- ② Display of the information about supervising organizations/companies and their cooperative efforts with foreign workers.
- ③ Sale of fair-trade goods & handicrafts from overseas.
- ④ Sale of cooked food made using fair-trade ingredients.
- ⑤ Exhibition sales of items/food products produced by in cooperation with foreign and Japanese workers.
- ⑥ Flea market, bazaar.
- ⑦ 'Try-out' corners (i.e., trying on traditional clothing, musical instruments, etc.).
- ⑧ Other *Please consult with the organizer.

■ Location of Booths Placement of the booths will be determined by the 2026 Festival Organizers

■ Booth operating hours 11:00 – 16:00 *No starting late or leaving early.

■ Items which the Nagasaki International Association can provide (to each group):

- Up to 1 panel board - Size: 91 cm x 182 cm or 90 cm x 172 cm.
- Up to 4 chairs ※ In the case you need more than 4 chairs, please contact us.
- Up to 2 desks - Size: 45 cm x 180 cm per desk.

■ Information Displayed on Sales Booth(s)

To encourage interaction and exchange with festival guests, please make sure to display the objectives and process(es) of making your products by using photographs, POP, etc.

※ For example, a booth that explains "This product was made by the children of <country>." and display photos of children of that country.

■ Important Reminders:

1. Keep your display of activities until the end of the festival (16:00) even if the items/goods have sold out.
2. The Food Sanitation Act prohibits the sale of homemade food or drinks.
3. The sale of alcoholic beverages without a license is prohibited.
4. If you plan to sell alcohol, please be sure to notify the Nagasaki International Association and submit a copy of your valid liquor sales license.

■ Examples of Festival Booths By businesses:

1. Sell items produced through cooperation with foreign and Japanese workers.
2. Present efforts implemented to facilitate foreign and Japanese workers to work together.
3. Introduce foreign workers' home countries (culture, games, etc.).
4. Provide opportunities for foreign workers and festival guests to interact.
