The following article, "An Interview with V-Varen Nagasaki Player Juanma", was originally a special feature to mark the 100th issue of the Japanese "なびあ(NAPIA)" Newsletter, and is being reprinted here in this foreign language newsletter, "NAPIA". (Interview conducted on Wed, August 8th at Isahaya Soccer Ground/Nagomi Club House)

1. Juanma, you have been active in your home country, Spain, as well as European countries such as Scotland. Why did you decide to sign with V-Varen Nagasaki here in Nagasaki, Japan?

One and a half years ago (January 2017), the coach and trainers came to Spain to see me play. They told me about their project to work towards the goal of "Promoting V-Varen Nagasaki to the J1 League". I really felt a connection with this project and its goals, so I decided to sign.



2. What is your impression of Nagasaki?

When I arrived in Nagasaki, I really felt like everyone was a big family together. Actually, I was warmly welcomed by the coach, players and everyone here, and I was helped out in many ways, so I have a great impression of Nagasaki.



One thing that is different to my home country is that all Japanese people value greetings and manners. A sense of mutual respect is something that is different to Spain, and I really like it.

4. While playing here in Nagasaki and Japan, have you encountered any difficulties?

One difficulty I have encountered since coming to Japan has been the difficulty of the language (Japanese). Also, because of the distance between Spain and Japan, it is difficult to arrange my schedule to spend time with my family. Due to daylight savings time, the time difference is about 7 hours. However, rather than the time difference or the physical distance, what is particularly difficult is being unable to meet or spend time with my family. I go back to visit them if I have at least 10 days vacation, and of course, during the off season.



4-2. Have you encountered any difficulties related to food?

In relation to food, I love Japanese food, so I haven't had any problems. Of the dishes I have eaten in Japan, my favourite has been corn soup.

5. What role do you think soccer and other sports play in international exchange between countries and indviduals?

Although there are both individual and team sports, communication is an essential part of any sport. Sport create a place for people to communicate, and this contributes directly to exchange between individuals and countries.

6. Have you had any opportunities to interact with regular people in Nagasaki Prefecture, outside of the team?

Outside the soccer ground and practice, there have been times when people have come up to talk to me. However, my Japanese isn't so good yet, so without an interpreter it's hard for me to communicate. Of course, because Japanese people value mutual respect and understanding, language is essential. However, I would really like people to come up and talk to me freely.

6-2 Until now, have you had any opportunities to interact with children?

There have been many opportunities for me to speak with children. I think that international exchange and offering something good in the future for children playing soccer, for example, inviting children to the club house and locker room and showing them where J1 players work and how they play soccer, will help children keep dreaming and will have a good impact.



7. What led you to start playing soccer?

After seeing three of my friends start playing soccer, I wanted to try it too. After talking with my family, my father took me to see the local club's practice. That was the start of my soccer career.

8. Was there a player you looked up to at that time?

At first, playing soccer is what I enjoyed, so I didn't have a player I admired. However, the number of my acquaintances gradually increased,

and I started watching Atlético Madrid games. Recently, when I've watched Sagan Tosu player Fernando Torres play soccer, I've thought "I also want to become able to play like that". I've been training hard while keeping his playing style in mind.

9. Please tell us your personal and team goals.

As a personal goal, I want to contribute to the team goals by scoring goals.

Our team goal is to keep a firm hold on our position in the J1 league. I think that when I score goals, it also helps contribute to the team goal.

10. Please tell us your message to the people of Nagasaki (Japan), including its foreign residents.

I think that people who come to Japan (including Nagasaki) from overseas will fall in love with this place after spending time with Japanese people, who respect the feelings of other people. Just the other day, it was reported that Japanese supporters at the World Cup picked up garbage from the stands. I think that the energy of Japanese people, who do these things naturally, is wonderful. I hope that you will always treasure this spirit. Personally, I think mutual respect and ease-of-living is No. 1. If the people of the world could learn from the way that Japanese people act, I think the world would become a better place.



Through this, it was easy to feel Juanma's friendliness and the way that he respects the people around him. We expect great things of him in the future. Thank you very much to Juanma and the V-Varen Nagasaki staff for your co-operation.
