Common Inquiry

Q) I'm going to move. What are the necessary procedures?

A) If you are moving within the same city or town, you will have to go to the municipal office where you live to submit a change-of-address notification(転居届) within 14 days after the moving date.

If you are moving to a different city or town, please submit the moving-out-notification(転出届) at the municipal office where you currently live. You will receive a moving-out-certificate (転出証明書). Please do this either within one month before or within 14 days after moving to a new city or town. Then you must take the moving-out-certificate(転出証明書) to the municipal office of the city or town you have moved to in order to register your new address (転入届 a moving-in-notification).

Whenever you visit the municipal office for each procedure, please take your Residence Card, My Number Card and National Health Insurance Card (if you have one) with you.

Please make sure to notify your nearby local post office of your change of address before you move out from your current address. By doing so, all mail that is addressed to your previous address will be forwarded to your new address.

This service will start on the day you notify the post office of your change of address and will last for one year.

You don't need to notify the immigration office of your new address as it will be updated automatically.
