From the World to Nagasaki

~Introducing a Foreign Resident in Nagasaki~



From Germany Danny Festor

Hello everyone! My name is Danny, and I'm from the Ruhr area in Germany. My wife is from Nagasaki, and when she became pregnant in 2018 we moved from Tokyo to Nagasaki to raise our child in her hometown. Starting last year I'm a freelance web developer. My dream is to help businesses from Nagasaki to grow by building their online presences. It's December already, which means it is Christmas time, so I want to tell you how Germans celebrate Christmas! Christmas is a very important holiday in Germany, so there are a lot of things you can look forward to.

Halloween is not really celebrated in Germany, so Christmas preparations start as early as the end of summer. In September, supermarkets start having Christmas exclusive sweets such as almond cookies called Spekulatius and chocolate gingerbread cake called Lebkuchen on their shelves. When November comes around, many supermarkets and radio stations slowly start playing more and more Christmas songs.

The main event starts with the beginning of the Advent season on the Sunday 4 weeks before Christmas. Families decorate their home with a traditional Advent wreath which has 4 candles. Every week an additional candle is lit while singing an additional verse of the advent song, until the last Sunday before Christmas when all 4 candles get lit and all 4 verses of the song get sung. A Christmas tree will also be decorated. Traditionally this Christmas tree is a real fir tree, but recently the number of artificial trees has also increased.

You can also enjoy a festival called Christmas Market. At Christmas markets you can enjoy beautiful illumination and try various foods and drinks. During the cold German winter adults especially enjoy a Glühwein, a hot wine punch. For children there are many booths that sell candy or toys, and there are merry-go-rounds and many other things to enjoy. The city Dortmund in the Ruhr area boasts the tallest artificial Christmas tree in the world, in Bochum you can enjoy strolling around a middle-ages-styled market, and every town has their own style of Christmas market, which makes them fun to explore.

When December starts, Children start a countdown to Christmas in the form of an advent calendar. Every day from December 1st to 24th, one door on the calendar can be opened, and you can enjoy chocolate, or other various sweets and maybe even small toys. Impatient children tend to eat the contents of their calendar on the first day, though.

Christmas in Germany is a 3 day long celebration starting with Christmas Eve on December 24. Other than America, Christmas Eve is the main event for many families. Families bake cookies together, sing Christmas carols, and trade presents on Christmas Eve. My family often enjoys a Raclette meal together.

December 25 is another day you spend with your family, while the 26 is a day you spend relaxing or with friends.

If you plan on visiting Germany, I highly recommend going while it's Christmas time!
