Japanese Culture Experience Class

"Making Kanzashi from Kimono Fabric!"

Kanzashi is a traditional Japanese ornamental hairpin that is placed in the hair as an ornament and is also used to tie up hair. It was very popular in the Edo period.

Nine residents of Nagasaki Prefecture attended this class which was taught by Ms. Akimi Morizuka. Ms. Morizuka taught the participants that the fabrics used for making kimono are made from materials that are suitable for that season and that each color and pattern used represents a certain wish. Participants chose the color and pattern of the kimono fabric of their wish to make a one-of-a-kind kanzashi.

## Introducing the Coordinator for International Relations (CIR) who began their post in Nagasaki in April 2024!



#### Q1: Where is your hometown?

I was born on an island called Geoje and began living in Busan when I was in high school. Both Geoje and Busan are located on the Southeastern end of Korea and are very close to Nagasaki.

Geoje is the second largest island in Korea, and there are many places where you can enjoy nature, such as Heugeumgang Islets and Oedo. Busan is the second largest city in Korea, after Seoul. Not only can you enjoy delicious foods such as dwaeji gukpap (pork broth with rice) and milmyeon (wheat noodles dish), you can also enjoy various cultures such as movies and sports. Please come visit!

### Q2: Why did you come to Japan? What do you want to do in Nagasaki?

My interest in Japan all began because of content such as anime. I wasn't good at public speaking to begin with, but through entering Japanese speech contests and volunteering as a Japanese interpreter, I was able to have new experiences and meet many people. I applied for the CIR position because I wanted a job that utilizes my past experiences and my interest in Japan.

I would like to contribute to the exchange between Nagasaki and Korea, including the friendship city of Busan. I would also live to visit all the various places in Nagasaki, and learn to speak the Nagasaki dialect.

### Q3: What are your hobbies and how do you like to spend your free time?

While lounging around at home, I like to read, listen to, watch or write something... basically I enjoy consuming content.

Recently I've gotten into Korean idols, and enjoy listening to the songs and watching fancams (live performances), so the ratio of "listening" and "watching" is high.

### Q4: Please give a message to the residents of Nagasaki Prefecture!

I look forward to getting to know all the charms of Nagasaki, one by one, and getting involved in the exchange between our two countries.

Although I am a novice, I will do my best to make steady progress. I look forward to your kind cooperation.



#### Q1: Where is your hometown?

My hometown is Neijiang City in the Southeastern part of Sichuan Province, China. Neijiang City is located in the breadbasket region of Sichuan Province, and has long prospered from sugarcane cultivation and the sugar industry, which is why it is named "Sweet City". Although it is named Sweet City, the local residents enjoy spicy food. The local specialty, called "大千干焼魚" (Daqian dry-braised fish), is carp fried to a golden brown and simmered in a sauce made from pickled peppers and bean paste.

## Q2: Why did you come to Japan? What do you want to do in Nagasaki?

My connection with Nagasaki goes back eight years. I majored in Japanese at Jilin University in China, and when I was in my third year, I was given the opportunity to study abroad for a short time at Nagasaki University of Foreign Studies, so I lived in Nagasaki for about six months. That's why I was glad when I heard that I would be dispatched to Nagasaki.

During my stay in Nagasaki, I want to experience the charms of Nagasaki Prefecture while deepening the mutual understanding between China and Japan at the grassroots level by speaking to the locals.

### Q3: What are your hobbies and how do you like to spend your free time?

My hobby is badminton. I play two or three times a week. I often travel on my days off. Earlier this year during Golden Week, I traveled to Fukuoka, Okinawa and Kumamoto in Kyushu. In the future, I would like to visit various places within Japan, and experience the customs of each region.

I will appear in the association's "Let's talk with a CIR!" once to twice a month. I look forward to using this opportunity to talk with you all in a casual setting.

### Beware of Typhoons (たいふう)

#### In Japan, there are many typhoons between July and October.

A typhoon is a tropical cyclone that develops over the tropical seas in the Southwestern North Pacific Ocean and can reach speeds of over 17m/s. When typhoons approach, they cause storms and heavy rainfall, and can result in disasters such as landslides, flooding and inundation. Even after the typhoon has passed, there are still risks of secondary disasters.



#### Find Out in Advance Where the Safe Locations Are!

#### Collect a hazard map from your workplace or your local city office.

You can find out where the "dangerous locations" and "evacuation centers" are in the event of a disaster such as a typhoon or earthquake. Check the areas around your home, school or workplace. It may be difficult to connect to the phone or internet during a disaster, so decide with your family in advance where you will escape to. At "evacuation centers", you can temporarily stay the night and sleep there. Because there are a lot of people, there are various rules in place.

#### When a Typhoon Approaches...

Move all objects from the balcony or outside to inside the house. Electricity and water may be cut off, so prepare flashlights and water. It is dangerous when glass breaks from strong winds, so make sure to close all windows and curtains, and stay away from the windows. Don't approach dangerous locations such as mountains, rivers and the sea.

Pack a bag of items you want to take with you if you need to evacuate.

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#### (Japan Meteorological Agency)


The forecast of disasters caused by heavy rainfall can be checked in 15 different languages. The map updates every 10 minutes with information on the risk of landslides, flooding and flood damage in increments of 1km.





#### Safety tips (App) (Official Japanese Government)

You can check "disaster information" in 14 different languages. By selecting the area in advance, you can receive alerts when warnings (e.g. earthquake early warnings, tsunami warnings and special warnings etc.) are released.



「嵐 静けさ」 前の Arashi no mae no sizukesa




